HERViewpoint: History of the Lumbee Tribe: Dr. Linda Oxendine, former Director of American Indian Studies at the University of North Carolina at Pembroke. While now retired she is still actively involved with the Lumbee Tribe and finds ways everyday to give back to her people. She encourages the people on the importance of keeping our heritage strong and alive for our future generations. She has written numerous articles and books about a variety of topics that touch American Indian and Lumbee languages and history.

HERChallenges: Facilitated panel: Three Women of our region sharing lessons and inspiration from their stories.

- **Charly Lowry:** (Lumbee) is a singer-songwriter from Pembroke, NC with roots in the Union Chapel Community. For over a decade, Charly has attained regional and national success as both a solo artist and lead singer of alternative rock/ soul/ folk band, Dark Water Rising. In 2004, Charly had the opportunity to compete on the wildly popular television show, American Idol. She ventured through several rounds of auditions to make it to the Top 32. Charly enjoys performing, meeting people, and educating others on the Native American experience.
- Mary Florian: Mary recently completed the Race Across America, which is the longest bicycle race in the world. Along with her team mate, Nancy Guth, they were the only 2 woman team (of ANY age) to successfully complete the race this year. In the 28 year history of the RAAM they were the 3rd 2 woman team to have completed it. Riding bicycles 3,000 miles from Oceanside, CA to Annapolis, MD in 9 days, 13 hours and 37 minutes. With both of these ladies being over age 60, what a great accomplishment.
- Letita Mason: Admission Director at The North Carolina School of Science and Math: Service and responsibility for ones community are concepts that, like a golden thread, color the tapestry of my life. They dictate that one must demonstrate courage when life delivers challenges; strength of conviction in staying true to your calling; firm grounding in supportive family and friends; the will and passion to stay long and work hard; child-like curiosity for life-long learning, training and development; and owning ones place in the continual evolution of our global community. I've learned to value the advantages of recognizing which strengths I bring to any assignment and employing them toward achieving goals. Essential to forging strategic initiatives and sustaining collaborative partnerships is my ability to relate to others; unquenchable thirst for knowledge and understanding of people, culture and history; and commitment to assisting others in fulfilling their highest potential. These serve as the filament of my life's work.

Sometimes you wonder if it's all worth it – family, work, life, and how to stay sane. Get this: Women throughout U.S. history have shared the same struggle! As they struggled, they fought for the right to vote, own property, and custody of their children in divorce.
